

# City Desk by Mayor Jeffrey T. Sherwin City Completes Lead Service Pilot Program

The water and sewer service lines that connect a home to the City's water and sewer systems belong to the individual property owner. Some of the water service lines are made of lead. These lead lines could infiltrate the water with elements that can negatively impact your health.

The State of Illinois has mandated that water suppliers, such as the City of Northlake, must replace the lead service lines. The cost of this replacement can be charged entirely to the property owner, or the City could assist by splitting the cost, or by paying the cost entirely through the use of loans, bond issues or higher water rates. The City is in the process of identifying the location of lead water service lines, and it is estimated that there are approximately 400 (out of 3000 customers) of these lead lines.

The City has opted to replace the lead service lines at no cost to the homeowners. Replacement of the lead service line was completed for 22 homes this year under a pilot program. The program was successful and provided valuable experience for the City. We will expand the program to include between 100 and 150 homes next year.

One of the things I was most surprised at was the lack of interest on the part of homeowners in the program. Out of the initial 22 homes selected, our response rate was about two thirds, with the rest of the residents not responding despite receiving 3 notices in both English and Spanish. The City sought replacement homes to complete the program and it took contacting 12 or more homes to fill the remaining 6 spots in the program.

The non-responding homeowners will be added to the list for next year, or future year's programs.

The City is working toward a goal of replacing all of the lead service lines within 5 years. Once this program closes, any non-responding homeowners will bear the entire cost of replacement of the lead service line at the time their home is sold.

The City will be sending out notices to potential participants in the next phase of this program toward the end of this year or very early next year.

Please do not ignore this important notice. It will not only be better for your family's health, it can save you substantial money as well.

Previously, the City had sent out lead water line surveys. If you have not completed the survey, or if you are not sure if you have a lead water service, please contact the Public Works Department at 708-562-0940. I can not stress the importance of this program enough and encourage your participation.

#### **Responsible Pet Ownership**

Pet owners are reminded of the following City ordinances regarding responsible pet ownership:

- Dogs must be properly restrained at all times. All pets should be on a leash or kept on private property.
- City Ordinance requires pet owners to clean up after their pets. This applies to pets being walked on public sidewalks and parkways, in parks or elsewhere in the City.
- It is unlawful to allow a pet to trespass on private or public property anywhere in the City.
- **Pet owners who violate these regulations are subject to fines.**

## Also note that Centerpoint Preserve is not an area to let dogs run loose.



#### Trees Available for Fall 2023

Trees for the Fall, 2023 planting are available. If you have room on your parkway to provide a home for a tree, call Public Works at 708-562-0940 to pick from the list of trees for the spring planting.

Trees absorb storm water runoff, absorb various pollutants, produce oxygen and help reduce summer temperatures. Trees also improve property values as well, and studies have indicated that a block with mature trees also tends to slow down traffic. Trees also absorb and reduce urban noise – produced by airplanes, cars and other sources.

Remember – trees located on the parkway or in the City's right of way cannot be cut or trimmed without the permission of the City. The right of way is generally the area 20 feet from the back of the curb. If in doubt, or if a tree in this area needs attention, call Public Works at 708-562-0940.

#### Wildlife Season

Many residents call about numerous sightings of skunks, possums, raccoons and stray cats throughout town. If you are experiencing problems with these animals, call Public Works for assistance. You can obtain a trap for public works for a \$60 refundable deposit. Once an animal is captured in the trap, call public works and they will come out first thing in the morning to take it away. You will be able to get the trap returned, or it will be turned in for you to receive the refund.

Public works phone number is 708-562-0940. Their hours are from 7: 00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

In the meantime, there are a number of steps you can take to discourage wild life from hanging around your home.

- 1. Keep your grass cut and gardens trimmed of excess growth.
- 2. Keep your firewood in a rack at least 12 inches off the ground.
- 3. Get rid of accumulated junk and debris which provide hiding and nesting places.
- 4. Keep your garbage in cans with lids securely attached not in plastic or paper bags, or in plastic bags or cans with no lids.
- 5. Don't leave cat or dog food out for your pets or neighborhood cats.
- 6. Fill in all voids under storage sheds these animals love to nest under sheds. Your shed should be built on a solid concrete or gravel base with wood retainers.
- 7. Patch all holes in your garage or shed siding to make sure these animals don't set up winter residence in your garage or shed.
- 8. Close off any access under your porch or low lying deck.

Remember, these few simple steps will encourage this urban wildlife to move on. Your cooperation is appreciated.

#### What To Do With Leaves

There are some procedures you need to remember regarding the leaves that fall at this time of year.

- -Do not rake the leaves to the curb or pile them in the parkway. They will wash into the storm drains.
- -Don't use plastic bags to collect the leaves.
- -Put them into paper bags or yard waste containers.
- -Put them out with the yard waste to be collected on Fridays.



The City of Northlake offers snow removal services to property owners who are over 65, disabled, handicapped and/or have severe health problems and have no one else who is able to help them with snow removal. Those interested in snow removal must re-apply every year. Deadline is November 4. No exceptions. Be sure to turn in your completed application before November 4, 2023. New applicants must submit medical verification from a doctor to City Hall in order to be eligible. Billing is \$15 per removal.
