

City Desk by Mayor Jeffrey T. Sherwin Northlake Preparing for the Rest of the 21st Century

The City of Northlake will implement several long awaited Public Works improvements in 2025 which will serve the City up to or past the year 2100.

First and foremost will be the rebuilding of the City's main water pumping station and 3 million gallon reservoir. This facility was originally built in 1960, and has served the City well. This project has been in the planning stages for some time and has finally cleared all of the regulatory hurdles. The \$10 million investment in this project will serve the community for the next 75 years.

The next project will be the reconstruction of Railroad Avenue with the replacement of the water main. We had hoped this \$6 million project would have started last year, but the IDOT review process took longer than anticipated. We are looking forward to this project which will serve our industrial areas. The watermain will have a 75 year life expectancy.

Other projects include the interconnection with the Village of Franklin Park's water system. Planning for this project, began in 2005, but the implementation has been delayed due to the work on the Tri-State tollway. The new water main has been placed under the new roadway and should be fully connected in 2025, insuring that the City has two sources of water through Melrose Park and Franklin Park.

The water main on Roy Avenue between Country Club and Belle will also be replaced. Eleven lead water services have been identified on these blocks and will be replaced as part of this project.

The City will be following up on the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District's Streambank Stabilization Project on the south side of town with the excavation and landscaping of adjoining areas to blend in and complement the MWRD's work.

Traffic signal modernization projects on Wolf Road are planned as well as various storm water management projects and sanitary sewer lining projects. The total investment in infrastructure for these projects will be approximately \$27 million. The City has lined up State and Federal funding of approximately \$10 million with the remaining amount paid from the 2025 budget and reserves the City has achieved while waiting for final approval on these projects.

Bond Issue to be Paid Early

In 2009, the voters approved a bond issue for the construction of the new police station. The bond issue runs until 2032. In December, the City will prepay a portion of this bond issue which will advance the final payment to December, 2028 instead of December, 2032, saving our residents \$557,425 in interest.

Northlake's 5th Data Center Underway

Ground was broken on September 24 for the T5 Data Center located at the end of Garnet Drive, just north of Grand Avenue. This will be Northlake's fifth data center.

The new facility will be called T5 Chicago III and will be 250,000 square feet with 36 megawatts for IT capacity.

The new data center will be T5's third facility in the Chicago area with the 3 story building becoming T5's flagship data center.



The City of Northlake has become an important data center submarket in the Chicago area. The real estate taxes generated by these centers support local government, especially the schools, benefitting all Northlake residents. The City of Northlake has seen continued redevelopment and investment in its industrial corridor from its beginnings in the 1950's.

Balanced Budget With No Tax Increase

In December, the City Council will be considering the City's budget for 2025. The proposed budget, which provides for a major infrastructure investment, is balanced with no increase in the City's portion of the real estate tax for the 7th year in a row. The City maintains a strong financial position through fiscal discipline as well as continued economic growth.

The infrastructure projects planned for 2025 are being done without an increase in real estate taxes or borrowing.

2024 Fall Tree Planting Completed

The City's 2024 tree program has been completed with the planting of 75 new trees throughout the City. The City plants 150 trees every year, half in the spring and half in the fall. Since 1997, over 4,000 trees have been planted by the City.

Trees are an essential part of the environment, providing shade to help reduce the urban "heat island" effect caused by heat being absorbed by concrete and asphalt. Trees also help with reducing carbon dioxide in the atmosphere by taking it in and producing oxygen, sequestering the carbon in its trunk and root system. Trees also help with storm run off by absorbing water and also increasing property values.

Please remember that trees in the parkway can not be cut without the City's permission. The parkway is generally the area 20 feet behind the curb. If you have a question about a tree in this area, or would like to reserve a tree for the 2025 planting season, call Public Works at 708-562-0940.

Northlake: An Industrial Powerhouse

According to the Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning's latest "Community Snapshot," the City of Northlake is one of the area's industrial power houses. Of the 15 communities that are located entirely in Leyden and Proviso townships, Northlake ranks #3 in assessed valuation of its industrial areas, at \$238,513,484.

Franklin Park is by far the largest, coming in at \$599,969,486, with Melrose Park coming in second at \$256,744,191.

What does this all mean? Having a strong and healthy industrial base provides employment for residents and a stable tax base to provide good schools and support local services, such as police, fire, libraries and parks, all of which have a direct impact on the quality of life in our communities.

We are fortunate to have this concentration of industrial strength available to our communities.

Collectively, we must all work together to maintain, strengthen and expand the commercial and industrial corridors so that our community remains one of the Chicago area's major job centers. The continued health and vitality of not only our communities, but surrounding communities, depends on it.

Christmas Recycling List

Even if you have been a good recycler all year long, what to do with holiday decorations and gift wrap may present a challenge. Here is the list of recyclable and non-recyclable.

Recyclable: gift boxes, tissue paper, shoe boxes, holiday cards/envelopes, gift bags (paper) and wrapping paper (non-metallic).

Non-Recyclable: bubble wrap, foam peanuts, ribbon and bows, sticky gift labels, coated gift bags, metallic wrapping paper, soiled disposable tableware, tree decorations.

Lead Water Service Replacement Moves Forward

The City of Northlake replaced 81 lead water services in 2024 at a cost of approximately \$600,000. Public Works crews will continue to inventory the system with a goal of replacing an additional 100 lead water services in 2025. It is estimated that 20% of the residential water services in Northlake are lead. The City is on track to complete the replacement program well before the 10 year deadline imposed by State and Federal authorities.

Golfview Water Main Replacement Completed

The water main replacement project on the 100 block of Golfview Drive was completed in October. This project took a little longer than usual because of coordinating construction work with ComEd's installation of an underground electrical cable at the same time. Besides the good news on completion of this project, no lead water services were discovered during the course of the project. The City's water main replacement program has been ongoing since 1990, with close to 40% of water mains being replaced since then, with all cast iron 4 inch diameter water main being replaced with 8 inch ductile iron mains. The new water mains have a service life of approximately 80 years, which will serve our community into the 22nd century.

Police Pension Funding Continues to Improve

The latest Municipal Compliance Report for the fiscal year ending 12/31/23 for the Northlake Police Pension Fund shows that the funding ratio has continued to improve going from 76% in the previous year to 77.76% for 2023. State law requires a 90% funding ratio by 2040.

If current trends and funding levels continue, and the City continues to exercise fiscal discipline, we should be able to meet the 90% requirement well before the 2040 deadline.




